## · · • NEWARK'S BIG FIRE LOSS

# W. V. Snyder's Damages Now Estimated at \$400,000.

### The Long Roll of Individual Losses of Other Merchants-Injured Still in Serious Condition.

NEWARK, N. J., Feb. 28 -- All that remained to-day of the handsome business block on Broad Street, between Cedar and West Park Streets, and the business buildings and residences on both sides of Cedar from Broad nearly to Halsey Street, was a smoking mass of ruins. An odd wall stood here and there, swaying to and fro until Streams were pulled down by the firemen. still being poured into the ruins this evening.

To the south of the smoldering maes stood the mammoth Bee Hive, one of the largest department stores in the city. The flames had spread into the rear of this building several times, but they were held in check and thus the great establishment was saved from total destruction.

By fur the heaviest loser is W. V. Snyder, in whose place the fire started. He had just got in his Spring stock, and this week additional \$40,000 in insurance had an placed on it. He has been in business here over forty years, and it is the first fire he has ever had. The total loss to Mr. Snyder is fixed at about \$400,000.

While the loss to himself is thus enormous. Mr. Snyder appears to feel more for his 300 employes, who are thrown out of work. They will have to do the best they can until he rebuilds. Plans are already in preparation.

it is believed that none will die, although Superintendent Oscar O. Shockelton and Firemen Braun and Harrison are still in a serious condition.

Aggregate Liability of Underwriters in Tuesday's Big Fire, \$600,000.

Nearly all of the local fire insurance companies were interested in the Newark loss on Tuesday night, a rough estimate of which yesterday placed the total damage at The loss was about \$600,000. felt more acutely by the companies because the Newark agents had been fighting for some months over rates, with the result that during the last six months of 1899 the premium receipts on Newark business amounted to \$34,000 less than the income for the corresponding period of 1898.
